Class letters are one of the best ways we can communicate with alums. Part of the role of class officers is to draft letters to their class a few times a year. It's a great way to update classmates on life events, stay connected with the college, and re-connect with your class. Statistics show that this is one of the most valued forms of communication to alums. Class letters have an incomparable 50%+ open rate!

Class letters are, by nature, flexible and meant to be tailored to the needs and desires of any given class. How it takes shape is really up to you. We understand this can be a bit daunting, and some of you have asked for guidance with this task. To that end, we've put together this packet to offer some ideas and inspiration for your own letters. We've included 3 class letter examples, embodying different styles and targeted to different generations. The letters are annotated throughout with thoughts and pointers. We've also created a quick reference guide of practical pointers below.

We do not at all want you to feel *limited* to these ideas/examples- just inspired!

Practical pointers:

- Try to include class news from as broad as cross section of your class as possible. Make the letters as inclusive as you're able to.
- Consider your audience: what life phase they are in may affect how much time they have to read the letter. Tailor your letter/length taking that fact into consideration.
- People love an action item or a link to learn more info.
 - o Remind classmates that they can always go online to the class website to see current updates
 - o Make sure you give a shout out to your facebook group to encourage folks to join and utilize it.
 - o Include a link to an interested story on the Gustavus website.
- People love photos! Throw back photos, current photos, what is happening on campus, new buildings, etc. You can include color photos with the pdf-electronic version of your letter.
- Leverage any social media groups for photos or updates! Ok to duplicate those photos in your letter, since not everyone is on Facebook.
- Add a historical touch to your letter. Nostalgia always plays well, whether it's a simple personal
 memory or something that takes a bit more research (online archives or a gander through your
 yearbook).
- Remind classmates to update Gustavus when they:
 - Get married
 - o Have a child
 - Change jobs
 - o Move

What not to do!

- Don't worry about perfection- anything is better than nothing!
- Don't be afraid to sing the praises of your alums!







Great use of Gustvaus archive info to add a historical touch to your letter

Do you remember the old Gustavus Pool? That pool, located in the basement of Alumni Hall, was built in 1922 and was one of the first indoor pools in Minnesota. Many of you may remember that old pool,



especially those who participated on the men's swim team or women's Aquatics League. There were only four swim lanes, compared to 11 on the new VIC GUSTAFSON pool. Despite the size, many great swim meets and aquatics productions took place in that pool. In the Aquatics League picture below, can you pick out our 10 classmates, who were Juniors in this picture from 1964-65?

I heard from **Peter Manfred** who commented on one of the "Up Dates" from 1966 that appeared in my last letter. He states; "Had to chuckle when reading the flashbacks shortly after graduation where **Ray Wargelin** reported that he was studying in Chicago to be a hairstylist. In reality, Ray was a brilliant student and was attending graduate school at the University of Chicago. I had occasion to converse with and visit Ray while I was also in Chicago at our Lutheran Seminary there. Sadly, Ray was a brittle diabetic who died not too many years after our days together in Chicago."

Upon reading this from Peter, I looked ahead in later updates and found another from Ray dated 2/71 where it states: "Raymond Wargelin is in a Ph.D. program in Humanities at Syracuse University." Wow, big difference from the "Jacques Peret Beauty School in Chicago" where he stated he was "studying to be a hair stylist!" Interesting. I think Ray was pulling a fast one on his classmates with that first update.

This class has a lot of history to draw on. What a great use of old class letters!

Peter went on to add: "I was at the 50-year luncheon at Gustavus this year. I, and sister Carol (class of '72) accompanied our Mother as the ONLY representative of the 80-year class of 1939. At 102, Mom not only gets around very well, but also played gathering music on the piano before the luncheon and during the program for the Gustavus Alma Mater. It was a beautiful day that included a visit to Resurrection Cemetery on the outskirts of town where my father, in-laws and probably 20 of my other relatives are buried. Lots of sweet nostalgia!"

the Marquis Who's Who in the South and Southwest and had several other board committee titles thru her career. Cheryl later in life became a Senior Tax Instructor and Preparer for H&R Block.

When I searched old *Quarterly* updates I found this update about Cheryl from 2/76; "*Cheryl Freeburg Berry* is director of the Medical Records Dept., at Nebraska Psychiatric Institute in Omaha, Neb. She has received faculty appointment at the Univ., of Neb., Medical Center and also teaches a night course at Metropolitan Technical Community College."
