Personal Resource Inventory

- What time parameters do I need to consider?
- When do I have time in my schedule to serve?
- Do I need to schedule the CBSL shuttle?
- What skills do I have to bring to a service experience?
- What are my interests and talents? What environments and organizations would be a good fit for me?
- What do I ultimately want to learn from this experience?

Implementing a Resource Inventory will assist you in:

- Making decisions about your service experience.
- Shaping the environment you hope to work in.
- Developing a time line that will support goal attainment.
- Identifying and prioritizing service site options.
- Preparing you for an interview with service site coordinating staff.
- Presenting a professional image that maximizes networking potential.

Implementing a Resource Inventory will remove the stress of service and create a fulfilling experience!
