Inaugural Gustavus Academy for Faith, Science, and Ethics a Huge Success

In June, 39 curious and passionate high school students from nine different states and over 20 different ELCA congregations gathered on the campus of Gustavus Adolphus College to deepen their faith and reflect on their vocations through an exploration of the connections between faith, science, and ethics. The first-ever Gustavus Academy for Faith, Science, and Ethics was made possible by a generous grant from the Lilly Endowment.

The Academy draws upon both the College's rich Lutheran traditions and legacy of excellence in science education through its annual Nobel Conference as it seeks to invite high school students into conversations about vocation and ethics that arise at the intersection of science and religion. The majority of the high school students who attended this year's summer program love science and are already dreaming about careers

in fields such as cancer research, astrophysics, medicine, and genetics. Some of the students are also thinking about pursuing pastoral leadership. Many of them stated that the Academy's summer program was the first time that they had experienced a community where both faith and science were embraced in worship, conversations, and academic lectures, and thus they could be fully present and show up as their full selves.

Students who attended the Summer Program engaged in a wide variety of faith practices designed to cultivate wonder and curiosity, including matins and vespers, small group theological conversations, text studies, star-gazing, investigation of the natural world through lectures and hands-on experiments, and vocational storytelling. They also had the opportunity to learn from a wide variety of

Freedom, Human Rights, and the Common Good: Contemporary Political Debates and Diverse Christian Responses

Exploring Religious Questions Series

October 3, 10, 17, & 24 | Olin Hall Room 103 | 7-9 p.m.

Each fall and spring the Office of Church Relations and the Bernhardson Distinguished Chair of Lutheran Studies co-sponsor the Exploring Religious Questions Series (ERQ), providing an opportunity for participants to delve deeper into the selected topic. Topics are chosen based on input from Gustavus faculty, suggestions from previous participants and community partners, as well as current events. Each session is designed to incorporate speaker presentations along with time for questions and discussion.

This fall's topic is *Freedom*, *Human Rights*, *and the Common Good:*Contemporary Political Debates and Diverse Christian Responses. During this election year and amidst domestic and international unrest, politicians and public leaders are debating a number of significant issues regarding freedom, human rights, and the common good. Contested issues range from religious freedom, freedom of speech, and the right to own guns to children's rights, food security, adequate health care, and education.

Christians here and abroad and across liberal and conservative lines are contributing to such debates, offering a variety of ideas and responses.

This series includes four evening sessions. The first session provides a framework for understanding some of the most significant freedoms and human rights debated among Christians around the world today. The next three sessions focus on particular examples of Christian concerns and diverse responses to them: the right to bear arms, freedom of speech, and religious freedom. Speakers include both Christian theologians and political scientists.

This series is open to the public. The cost is \$35/person (includes four sessions, materials, and light refreshments). Pre-registration is required. Nobel Conference 52

In Search of Economic Balance—September 27 & 28, 2016

The transition to a world economy has revealed a variety of tradeoffs that polarize economists and policy makers. Optimizing a business for efficiency often results in fewer and lower paying jobs. Regulating businesses for the public good may reduce their ability and incentive to develop innovative solutions to challenging problems. In the end, we are left with questions like: Why does inequality matter? Can we bring the prosperity enjoyed by the world's advanced economies to the rest of the world? How do we grow economies in a sustainable way that benefits most, if not all of the population? The 2016 Nobel Conference: *In Search of Economic Balance*, which will take place September 27-28, brings economists from around the world to help us grapple with these questions and understand some of the challenges facing real-world implementation of economic theories.

Reserved seating tickets are \$120 each and general admission tickets are \$75 each for the two-day conference. Single day tickets are also available. A separate ticket (\$30) is needed for the closing banquet featuring Chris Farrell on Wednesday evening. High school and college student delegation tickets can be purchased for \$6 per student/ chaperone, with a 10-ticket minimum. 

experts in theology, biblical studies, ethics, biology, physics, astronomy, ministry, medicine, and advocacy.

This summer's featured speaker, astronomer Grace Wolf-Chase from the Adler Planetarium in Chicago, described her own journey of connecting her Lutheran faith to her scientific pursuits in lectures and during informal lunch and dinner conversations with students. The impact of all these activities was eloquently described by students at the end of the week in comments such as this one: "I am more aware of the larger ethical issues gripping our world and how I can find my vocation by engaging in solutions to these issues by using my faith and science together. Additionally, I feel as though part of my vocation is to educate my peers on how science, faith, and ethics can work together."

Please invite high school students in your congregations who have a strong interest in science and STEM-related fields to apply to be an Academy Fellow next year at the Gustavus Academy for Faith, Science, and Ethics. Because of our grant funding, we have generous travel and tuition scholarships available for outstanding students from all economic backgrounds and geographical locations. Gustavus Leadership Program for High School Youth

Gustavus is excited to offer a new leadership development resource for high school youth. Co-sponsored by the offices of Community-Based Service and Learning and Church Relations, STEP UP Leadership **Development** is a day-long experience that will introduce youth to college-level concepts of leadership and will help them develop a stronger personal plan for continuing to grow as a leader. The day will include three seminar sessions focused on engaging students as they learn valuable skills and expand their vision for potential leadership possibilities. Participants will receive a certificate from Gustavus Adolphus College acknowledging the completion of the STEP UP leadership curriculum. STEP UP will be offered twice during the 2016-17 academic year: Thursday, November 3, 2016 and Thursday, March 9, 2017. The registration fee is \$40 per student (includes lunch and STEP UP t-shirt). Adult leaders accompanying youth must register, but attend at no charge. Adult leaders will meet separately during Leadership Seminar time slots to hear an overview of the student curriculum, learn about other resources available at Gustavus, and to share in guided small group discussions. This program is open to student groups from congregations and schools as well as individual students who wish to attend on their own.



Why Endow Church Relations Now?

At the time the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) was forming, Gustavus Adolphus College created the Gustavus Association of Congregations (GACAC) as a way to maintain the grassroots, relational connections at the congregational level so valued by the Gustavus community for living rootedness in Lutheran identity. Working in partnership with the GACAC member congregations, the Gustavus Church Relations outreach has made Gustavus a leader among the ELCA colleges in actively working to collaborate with congregations to develop and share resources that serve our shared mission to young adults and society. Will our Church have a College that supports this shared mission? Gustavus Adolphus College lives out an affirmative response with a desire to do even more.

To that end, the John D. and Ruth Hogenson-Rutford Endowment for Church Relations was created as a means for providing permanent

funding for the Gustavus Church Relations staff and program, and to expand the programming outreach for the network. Being a part of the Gustavus Adolphus College Association of Congregations

How can Gustavus resources help your congregation this year? We have a wealth of resources available to our Association member congregations, and we want to serve you!

Listed below are many of the signature programs from Church Relations. Some congregations use multiple resources every year; others use fewer, or as needed.

Confirmation Retreats held on campus may be one day or overnight retreats during the academic year. Hostel space is available for overnight reservations. Please book at least six to eight weeks in advance; space is limited for groups over 40. Classrooms and space for recreation are available to meet your programming needs.

Adult Retreats are welcomed in the Retreat Center on campus. Church councils, staffs, and men's and women's groups enjoy time to socialize and work together, build relationships, and enjoy the energy of a Lutheran campus.

Individual Clergy Sabbath Retreats are available to Association pastors, usually scheduled during the week.

Partners in Education—over 30 faculty and staff are available to make presentations on a wide variety of topics during Sunday morning forums in Association congregations. Church Relations coordinates these services and the congregation pays an honorarium plus mileage.

Partners in Music—student vocal and instrumental musical ensembles may visit your congregation to assist in worship.

Congregation pays honorarium and mileage.

Gustavus Youth Outreach— This student-led fellowship organization seeks to serve the needs of congregational youth programs, assisting in programming with your youth for day or evening in lock-in or retreat settings. Your congregation covers mileage expenses for the Gustavus students, meals if applicable, cost of supplies or special materials, and housing if needed. A new offering from GYO provides a service opportunity at your location or while on campus for a Youth Retreat. For more information go to gustavus.edu/gyo.

Scholarships—The *Lutheran Leadership Award* is for students from Association congregations attending Gustavus. *Matching Scholarships* are available for any students receiving congregational funds to attend Gustavus.
