

Problem Checklist

Choosing an appropriate community problem is the first step in developing a successful project. As you brainstorm, consider the following necessary qualities of an appropriate problem.

- I am a member of the community in which the problem exists.
- The problem does not include the words “lack of” in its description.
 - The “lack of” something is not a problem. In the harms caused by the lack, you might find an appropriate problem.
- The problem is an issue of social justice.
- People other than my friends and relatives believe that the problem exists and is urgent.
- I can find evidence that the problem exists.
(Newspapers, interviews, minutes of public meetings, official websites, etc.)
 - List known sources for that evidence.
- I can find evidence that the problem is significant (worthy of community consideration)
(Newspapers, interviews, minutes of public meetings, official websites, etc.)
 - List known sources for that evidence.
- I can find evidence that the problem is urgent (requires immediate attention).
(Newspapers, interviews, minutes of public meetings, official websites, etc.)
 - List known sources for that evidence.
- Members of the community believe the problem is significant and urgent.
 - The community has considered the problem previously and took action.
 - The community has considered the problem and not taken action.
 - The community has not officially considered the problem but a diverse set of community members believe the problem is significant and demands action.
 - None of the above apply. Choose another problem.
- Currently, the community is not taking action or planning action on the problem.
 - If the community is acting or has plans to act, then choose another problem.
 - If the current or proposed action is controversial or will result in other problems, see your professor for guidance.
- I can find information about past discussions and actions regarding this problem.
 - If the problem is recent, then continue with a careful eye to whether action is planned.
 - If it is an historic problem, dig deeper to determine why the community has not acted before continuing with this problem.
