


WELCOME graduates, families, and friends to Christ Chapel! Graduates, this is a day you have been working toward for a long time. The Baccalaureate service has its origins in the medieval European custom of presenting candidates for the degree of bachelor, *bacca*, with laurels, *lauri*, in celebration of and thanksgiving for lives dedicated to learning and wisdom.

Because Gustavus is rooted in the Lutheran tradition and open to people of all faith traditions, we begin this day of Commencement with singing, prayer, and blessing of our graduates. We rejoice that our Gustavus community includes people from many different religious, spiritual, and philosophical backgrounds and that the community that is gathered today is wonderfully diverse.

We also acknowledge that Gustavus Adolphus College is located on the homelands of the Dakota people. The Minnesota River and its watershed are sacred places; these waters and lands are interconnected with Dakota culture, language, creation stories, spiritual rites, livelihood, and sustenance. We seek to honor Dakota people by telling the truth about this history and their enduring presence in this place.

Today's service has been planned around Gustavus' five core values of excellence, community, justice, service, and faith. We gather to remember that we are all connected by our common humanity and through our shared calling to work together in the spirit of love to create a more just, equitable, and peaceful world. 
