A Knowing Woman was given to Gustavus Adolphus College in 2006 by the children of Lloyd and Fran Engelsma. Created by Minnesota sculptor Gloria Tew, A Knowing Woman is dedicated in memory of Fran Engelsma, one of the founding members of Gustavus Library Associates.

Tew was charged with creating a sculpture that would capture the spirit and essence of Fran, a woman who stood graciously beside her entrepreneurial husband for decades—strong but gentle, committed but usually out of the limelight. The sculpture Tew created depicts a woman who is reaching her hand out to people, inviting them to read and to learn.

Fran was instrumental in the creation of Gustavus Library Associates in 1977. It was a perfect fit for her. Already an avid reader, adult learner, and an honorary Gustie, she jumped at the opportunity, becoming a leader in the organization's formative years and contributing to its many successes.

A Knowing Woman stands in the Folke Bernadotte Memorial Library as a tribute to Fran Engelsma's commitment and contributions to college education for generations of students and to the organization she helped found.

In 2020, as the isolation of the worldwide pandemic spread, Craig explored ways to fill the empty space in his life by creating something positive, hoping it might also enrich the lives of others. Over the years, he had enjoyed sharing his photographs from all seven continents with friends. Photography, and the simple structure of traditional Japanese haiku, sparked his pandemic haiku flame. Violette Toussaint is the caretaker at a cemetery in a small town in Bourgogne. Her life is lived to the predictable rhythms of the often funny, always moving confidences that casual mourners, regular visitors, and sundry colleagues share with her. Violette's routine is disrupted one day by the arrival of Julien Sole—local police chief—who has come to scatter the ashes of his recently deceased mother on the gravesite of a complete stranger. It soon becomes clear that Julien's inexplicable gesture is intertwined with Violette's own complicated past.

#### The Story of More by Hope Jahren

In The Story of More, Hope Jahren illuminates the link between human habits and our imperiled planet. In concise, highly readable chapters, she takes us through the science behind the key inventions—from electric power to large-scale farming to automobiles—that, even as they help us, release greenhouse gases into the atmosphere like never before. At once an explainer on the mechanisms of global change and a lively, personal narrative, this is the essential pocket primer on climate change that will leave an indelible impact on every reader.

#### Woman on the Edge of Time by Marge Piercy

Connie Ramos is a Mexican American woman living on the streets of New York. Once ambitious and proud, she has lost her child, her husband, her dignity—and now they want to take her sanity. After being unjustly committed to a mental institution, Connie is contacted by an envoy from the year 2137, who shows her a time of sexual and racial equality, environmental purity, and unprecedented self-actualization. But Connie also bears witness to another potential outcome: a society of grotesque exploitation in which the barrier between person and commodity has finally been eroded. Hailed as a classic of speculative fiction, this landmark novel is a transformative vision of two futures and what it takes to will one or the other into reality.

#### Carnival Lights by Chris Stark

In August 1969, two teenage Ojibwe cousins, Sher and Kris, leave their northern Minnesota reservation for the lights of Minneapolis. The girls arrive in the city with only \$12, but it's the ancestral connections they are also carrying that shape their journey most. Making their way to the Minnesota State Fair, the Indian girls try to escape a fate set in motion centuries earlier.

#### What a Wonderful World by Anders Björling

When he was 14, Anders Björling used his father's camera to capture a moment during a summer vacation at Siarö. The resulting photograph inspired him to pursue and hone the artform throughout his life and far-flung travels, from Sweden's Stockholm Archipelago to Tanzania's Ngorongoro Crater, and from the peaks of South America to the glacial lagoons of Iceland. This book contains 15 vibrant examples of photographic memories Björling has collected in celebration of our wonderful world.

#### My Vanishing Country: A Memoir by Bakari Sellers

Anchored in his hometown of Denmark, South Carolina, Sellers's memoir illuminates the pride and pain that continues to fertilize the soil of one of the poorest states in the nation. Sellers traces his father's rise to become a friend of Stokely Carmichael and Martin Luther King Jr. and member of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) while exploring the plight of the South's dwindling Black working class. Sellers poetically humanizes the struggles that shape the lives of people who are his family, friends, and neighbors: gaining access to healthcare as rural hospitals disappear; making ends meet as the factories shut down and move overseas; holding on to precious traditions as their towns erode; forging a path forward without succumbing to despair.




