

Affordable Care Act Preventative Drug List

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) requires that eligible people get certain preventative medications at no cost. This means that you will pay \$0 even if you have not met your deductible. Your doctor must write a prescription for the medication for it to be eligible at no cost to you, even if it is considered an over the counter (OTC) product. Please note that some products have additional requirements to receive full coverage from your plan.
